Winter Tips & Solutions



Styrofoam packaging is often a problem for customers. Do not put any type of Styrofoam in the blue recyclables cart. Read below about disposal solutions from Recology.

Styrofoam packaging material keeps items safe when they are mailed, but the pesky "peanuts" present some disposal problems for customers.

Place small amounts of Styrofoam packaging material into tightly sealed bags and dispose of the bag in the trash. Do not place loose packaging material into the cart. It may blow away when emptied. Styrofoam "peanuts" may be taken to shipping stores that reuse them.

Your driver will collect larger bags of Styrofoam that have been sealed in a plastic bag and placed beside your trash cart. Call or email us at least one day before your regular trash collection day to schedule a pickup. There is no extra charge for this service.

All forms of Styrofoam including solid packaging material, food containers, hot beverage cups, and any other form must be placed in your trash cart. No form of Styrofoam should be placed in the blue recyclables cart.

Bulky Item Collections

Start 2016 off right by having Recology haul away your unwanted items. Drivers from **Recology** will come to your location to collect large items



or extra bagged trash. Customers may schedule up to two Bulky Item Collections each calendar year. Call **Recology Vallejo** at 552-3110 at least one day before your regular collection day to schedule your Bulky Item Collection. Two cubic yards of material may be set out for each collection. E-waste may be included in the two yards. Two cubic yards equal about ten 32-gallon bags, or a couch, mattress, or other single large item. Each appliance, like an air conditioner or washer, counts as one collection. Customers with a large amount of materials may combine their two Bulky Item Collections into a single collection of four yards of materials.

Tough Disposal Solutions

Customers may bring extra cardboard, latex paint, antifreeze, auto & household batteries, used oil & oil filters, cooking oil, fluorescent bulbs, sharps, and e-waste to the BOPA facility at 2021 Broadway, Thursday through Saturday, from 8AM until 4PM.



It is finally raining in California! The wet weather will soon bring an abundance of tree and plant growth. Remember to use your green yardwaste cart for leaves, grass clippings, weeds, and tree and shrub prunings. Cut prunings small enough to fit in the cart. The lid on your cart must close. Never place plastic bags, garbage, or non-yardwaste materials into your cart. Bundles, boxes, or bags of materials placed outside of the cart will not be collected.

No Propane Tanks!

Propane fuel tanks and bottles pose a serious danger to drivers and employees who sort materials. **Recology** asks customers to never mix fuel containers in with recyclables or trash. The tanks present a risk of fire and explosion.

To properly dispose of propane tanks, empty them and then remove the pressure relief valve. Take the empty tanks to the Napa-Vallejo Household Hazardous Waste Collection Facility located at 889 Devlin Road in American Canyon. The HHW facility is

open on Friday and Saturday from 9AM to 4PM. Give them a call for complete information at 1-800-984-9661.

A Social Reminder

Customers are able to download new apps that show your collection schedule and provide reminders about service. Click on the Apple App Store or Google Play to download the new apps to your smartphone.

Customers are also able to access this service on our website. There you can also schedule service reminders. Just click on recologyvallejo.com.

Missed Collection?

Call us by noon if drivers miss your collection, and we will return the same day. If you call after noon, we will return on the following day to collect your materials. At least three trucks collect yardwaste, recyclables, and trash. These trucks do not all come at the same time, so some carts remain full until all three trucks have visited your street.

What can and cannot be recycled?

Below is the list of acceptable and *unacceptable* materials for the blue recyclables cart.

Glass

All beverage and food containers in all colors. Empty container, rinse, and remove lid or cap. No drinking glasses, ceramics, window glass or mirrors, fluorescent tubes or light bulbs.

Paper

Newspaper, boxes, bags, cardboard (flattened), magazines, catalogs, glossy paper, phone books, softcover books, shredded paper in paper bags, rinsed milk cartons, rinsed juice cartons, junk mail, envelopes, all colors of office paper. No hardcover books or binders, soiled papers, food wrappings, napkins, tissues or towels.

Plastic

All #1 through #7 narrow-neck bottles (water, soda, and detergent bottles), trays and containers. All California Redemption Value (CRV) containers. Plastic tubs for margarine, butter, yogurt, etc. Empty all containers and rinse.

No plastic-like toys, garden hoses, etc., plastic bags or Styrofoam, PVC or other piping.

Metal

Food and beverage cans (aluminum, steel, and tin). Rinse. Clean aluminum pans or foil. Empty aerosol cans. Loose lids from jars.

No electronic or computer equipment, hangers, scrap metal, fuel tanks, propane tanks, etc.


