FOOD SCRAPS UPDATE

Special thanks to all of you who have been participating in the new food scraps program. Since adding food scraps to the yard trimmings, the amount of organic material collected from homes has increased by 28 percent. If you aren't yet separating your food and food-soiled paper, we encourage you to join your neighbors and give it a try. For information about the program, visit our website at MountainView.gov/FoodScraps.

Why aren't frozen food boxes compostable or recyclable?

These boxes are manufactured to withstand moisture for long periods of time. Such boxes do not break down in either the composting or recycling processes.

- Place frozen food boxes in the trash.
- Compost food-soiled paper plates, paper take-out boxes, pizzeria boxes, etc.
- Recycle clean, dry food boxes like cereal and cake boxes.



BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR

Consider your neighbors before you set out "free" items for others. Although we applaud this reuse and sharing, it can create a nuisance for the neighborhood. Please follow these guidelines:

- If you want to offer items, keep them on your driveway. Items left at the curb can confuse people, generating calls to the City about abandoned garbage.
- Securely attach a "free" sign.
- Remove items if they are not taken in a day or two.
- Never set out items on the sidewalk, curb or street unless you have an appointment for Recology collection (see p. 10).

RECYCLE RIGHT —IT'S MORE IMPORTANT THAN EVER!

Why? The Chinese government recently set strict new standards to improve the quality of recyclable paper bound for paper mills in China. Most paper from the U.S. goes to China and few other market options currently exist, so this is an issue that is seriously impacting recycling programs across the country. Mountain View's current program of collecting containers separate from paper dramatically improves quality and gives us a distinct advantage in the market place. However, there is more you can do to help keep our recycling rates high:

- Don't put any type of plastic in with your paper recycling. If you use plastic bags to contain the recycling on its way to the cart, empty the bag and then reuse it or put it in the garbage.
- Don't recycle paper that has food residue on it. Put food-soiled paper in your compost cart with other food scraps. Recycle paper milk and soup cartons with containers.
- Use the online tool at MountainView.gov/WhatGoesWhere to find out how to dispose, recycle or compost items.

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MATERIALS RECOVERY IN MOUNTAIN VIEW

SMART STATION

Ever wonder what happens to Mountain View's garbage, recycling and compostables? Our system is a bit unique. Recology collects these materials and delivers them to the Sunnyvale Materials Recovery and Transfer (SMaRT) Station. Created through a partnership of the cities of Mountain View, Palo Alto and Sunnyvale, the SMaRT Station® is one of the largest and most efficient materials recovery facilities in the United States. It is not a landfill. In fact, the purpose of this sorting and transfer station is to prevent valuable resources from ending up in the landfill.

RECOVERY FROM GARBAGE

Recyclable material is pulled from the garbage through mechanical and manual sorting. On average, SMaRT diverts 25 to 30 percent of garbage received. Remaining garbage is taken to Kirby Canyon Landfill in San Jose. But please keep sorting your recyclables, as the sorters and equipment can't capture everything and cleaner materials have a higher resale value.

RECYCLING

Recyclable materials collected from residents and businesses are sorted and prepared to ship to market. The revenue produced helps reduce the cost of providing the service.

YARD TRIMMINGS AND FOOD SCRAPS

Organic materials are processed and shipped to a composting facility. Finished compost is available to residents at no charge (see page 8).

MOUNTAIN VIEW RECYCLING CENTER

For the convenience of residents, the City's recycling center is located at 935 Terra Bella Avenue and is operated by Recology. This State certified redemption center allows residents to receive return deposits on beverage bottles and cans. Redeeming containers at this particular recycling center keeps revenues working for your community. The City receives additional money from the State redemption fund and Recology receives the salvage value of the materials. The additional revenues are returned to the utility fund to help keep trash rates low. The Center also accepts many other recyclables during drop-off hours and sells extra garbage tags. FOOD SCRAPS COMPOSTING

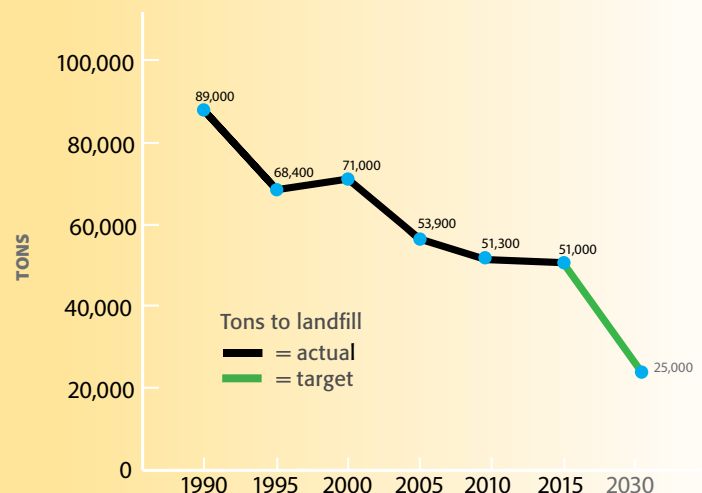
Nearly 6,500 tons of food scraps and food-soiled paper are collected annually from businesses in Mountain View. These materials are taken directly to a composting facility and turned into valuable soil amendments. A residential food scraps collection began in July 2017.

What is Zero Waste?

Zero Waste is a philosophy that embraces not only our traditional ideas about reduce, reuse, and recycle, but also modern ideas about considering the entire life-cycle of products, processes and systems to eliminate "waste." A Zero Waste Plan is under development. The plan will analyze the diversion potential of various programs and strategies, resulting in quantifiable goals to keep us on track to Zero Waste. The chart illustrates the City's past progress in reducing landfill disposal and a look at where a zero waste strategy could take us.

Accepts e-waste, paint, oil, pesticides, cleaning and pool chemicals, propane or helium tanks, smoke detectors, thermostats, medications, syringes, needles, household batteries, fluorescent light bulbs and tubes, fire extinguishers, flares, and more.

SINGLE-FAMILY SERVICE

Where to Set Out Carts

Set out all carts by 7 am on collection day with wheels against the curb. Leave at least 18 inches between carts, and keep away from over-hanging items like trees, balconies and basketball hoops. Remove carts no later than next day and store carts out of street view (inside garage, behind fence or hedge). No carts on top of curb unless there is no room on street due to parked cars. Do not block sidewalk.

HAVE EXTRA GARBAGE?

Purchase extra garbage tags for \$6 from most local Safeway and Nob Hill stores, City Hall (Finance Department, 2nd floor), or the Mountain View Recycling Center (Tuesdays–Saturdays, 9 am–4 pm). Attach one tag to each 32-gallon garbage bag and place next to your garbage cart.



Leave 18–24 inches between carts

How to Recycle

Mixed Paper

Place in paper side of split cart (grey lid).

Cardboard

Flatten all cardboard. Place small pieces on paper side of split cart. Cut or fold large pieces to 3' x 3', tie or tape bundles, and place next to cart. Take large amounts of cardboard to Mountain View Recycling Center (see page 8).

Household Batteries/Cell Phones

To reduce risk of fire, tape positive (+) end, seal in bag (available from Recology), set on top of cart. Place cell phones in separate, clear bag.

Mixed Containers

Place in container side of split cart (blue lid).

Motor Oil and Filters

Put used motor oil in clear, one-gallon, plastic jug with screw-top lid. Put filters in clear, resealable plastic bag. Set on curb. Jugs and bags available from Recology.

Used Cooking Oil

Put in a clear plastic bottle or jug with screw-top lid and set on curb next to recycling cart.

EXTRA RECYCLING

Set out no more than 2 extra containers of recycling next to cart—cans and bottles in one paper bag or box and paper in another. No plastic bags please. If you regularly have extra recycling, order a larger or second cart.

Compact Fluorescent Bulbs (CFLs)

Place in clear, resealable plastic bag and set on curb next to recycling cart (no tubes).



EXTRA YARD TRIMMINGS

On your regular compost collection day, you may set out no more than 2 extra containers of yard trimmings (please put food scraps only in the cart). Use large paper lawn and leaf bags (available at home, hardware and garden stores) or plastic cans. Limit 32-gallons and 50 pounds per container. No metal cans or plastic bags please. If you regularly have extra trimmings, order a larger or second cart.

MULTI-FAMILY SERVICE

How to Recycle

Multi-family complexes share group carts for recycling—tan carts for paper and cardboard and grey carts for containers.

Containers

Place glass bottles and jars, plastic bottles, plastic jugs, tubs and lids, metal cans and lids, and soup and milk cartons in the grey cart. No plastic bags.

Cardboard

Flatten all cardboard.
Place small pieces in the tan cart.
Cut or fold large pieces to no larger than 3' x 3', tie or tape bundles, and place next to cart.
Some complexes have white Cardboard Only bins. If you don't have a bin, take large amounts of cardboard to Mountain View Recycling Center (see page 8).

Paper

Place newspaper, mixed paper and food boxes in the tan cart. No frozen food boxes.

Buddy Bags

Specially designed bags are available for residents to carry sorted recyclables to shared carts. Property representatives should call Recology to inquire about how to obtain free bags.



ROW HOUSES

Where to Set Out Carts

- Row houses are single-family homes typically attached to each other with common walls, or slightly separated. Garages usually face a narrow private drive.
- Check your CCRs for the specified collection location, especially for units on dead-end drives.
- Do not place carts within a 20 foot wide drive aisle. Carts should be placed in front of garages or to the side (2 feet from any pipes).
- Carts must be stored in garages (or side yards if available) at all other times.



Safety First!

Many rowhouse and townhome developments have small landscape strips located between garages. Sometimes water and gas lines are located in these areas. Please be careful when placing carts out for service, as the collection truck lifting arm can accidentally hit and damage these pipes. Allow at least 2 feet of clearance between your cart and any pipes.

- Bread, pasta, cereal and grains
- Dairy products (solids and semi-solids)
- Eggshells, nutshells, seafood shells
- Fruits and vegetables
- Leftover or spoiled food
- Meat, fish and chicken, including bones
- Coffee grounds, paper filters and tea bags
- Paper egg cartons and mushroom boxes
- Paper plates and cups, take out boxes
- Paper towels and napkins
- Pizzeria boxes (no frozen food boxes)
- Waxed paper
- Branches and prunings (under 4' long and 6" in diameter)
- Flower bouquets or plants
- Grass, leaves and weeds

No liquids, plastic packaging (including any marked compostable), frozen food boxes, bamboo canes, cactus, ice plant, palm fronds, yucca, or landscape materials (stakes, bender board, trellis, pickets)

Curbside Recyclables

- Everything that is accepted in the curbside program, except motor oil (see pages 4 and 6 for accepted items)

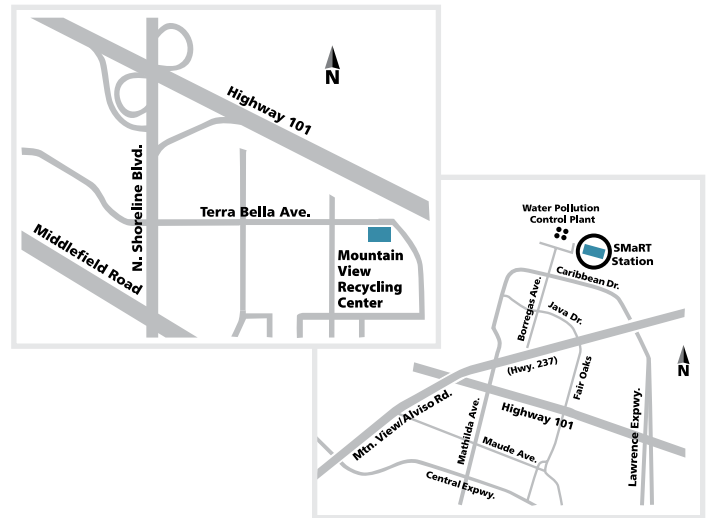
Other Recyclables

Leave these items with the attendant (items marked with an asterisk* have limited recycling markets so are not guaranteed to be recycled):

- Aerosol cans* (empty)
- Clothing and shoes for donation
- E-waste – computers, monitors, printers, TVs, etc.
- Film plastic* (bread bags, dry cleaner bags, bubble wrap, zip lock bags, etc.) – bundle pieces inside a plastic bag
- Frozen food boxes and other waxed paperboard*
- Metal scrap less than 6 feet long (pots, pans, trays, utensils, tools and other small all-metal items)
- Rigid plastics* – pails, buckets, plant pots, etc.
- Textiles* – unusable clothes, sheets, blankets, towels

Large Items (you must call ahead)

- Appliances – no refrigerators, freezers or air conditioners
- Mattresses and box springs
- Plastic children's toys – slides, climbers, etc.
- Wood and lumber – clean only, no painted or treated wood
- Yard trimmings (no food scraps)

The SMaRT Station is the materials recovery and refuse transfer facility shared by the cities of Mountain View, Palo Alto and Sunnyvale. In addition to processing collected garbage, recycling and yard trimmings, the Station has a CRV buy-back center, a recycling drop-off area and accepts debris from the public (fees apply).

OPERATING HOURS

Daily 7 days a week, 8 am to 5 pm

BUY BACK CENTER

Redeem California Redemption Value (CRV) bottles and cans for cash.

DROP OFF SERVICES

See table on page 7 for list of items accepted at the recycling center free of charge, including mattresses.

RE-USE TRAILER

Take home items rescued from cleanup programs for free. Located in the Recycling Center area.

FREE COMPOST

For pick up by residents (bring ID and containers – shovel available). Limits apply, call first to check supply.

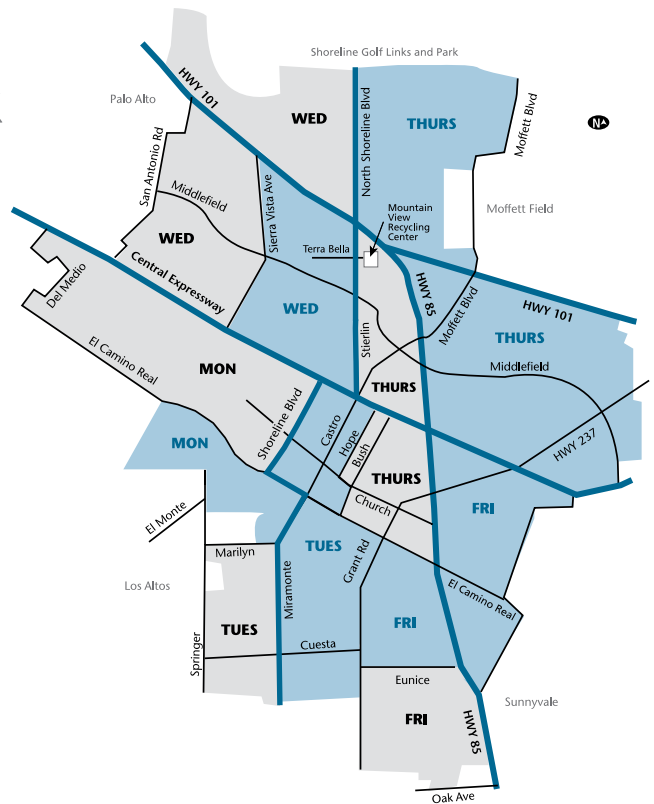
Collection Day & Recycling Week

- Garbage and compost carts are collected *weekly*.
- Recycling carts are collected *every other week*.
- To find your collection day and recycling week: locate your neighborhood on the map and note collection day and color (blue or grey). Match color to the calendar for recycling week.
Example: On Church Street between Hope and Castro, garbage and compost collection is every Tuesday and recycling collection is every other Tuesday on blue weeks, beginning on January 9.
- Also find collection day schedules and set up service reminders at MountainView.gov/MySchedule

HOLIDAYS

Collection occurs on all holidays except Thanksgiving (November 22), Christmas (December 25) and New Year's Day (January 1).

If your collection day falls on or after the holiday, collection will occur one day later that week. For example, for a Thursday holiday, Thursday collection will take place on Friday and Friday collection will take place on Saturday.

CLEAN UP PROGRAMS

On Call Plus

Eligible residents may schedule three (3) free appointments each year, to set out extra trash, recycling or yard trimmings PLUS up to three bulky items, such as appliances or furniture. This program is not available to apartments (fee service can be arranged with Recology).

Call Recology at **(650) 967-3034** to schedule an appointment and follow the set out guidelines illustrated below. Visit **MVrecycle.org** for a detailed list of accepted items.

HOW-TO SET OUT

Group items for collection by different trucks—recycling, yard trimmings, trash and bulky goods.

Set out up to 3 bulky items.



Contain loose items in boxes, bags and bundles that each weigh no more than 50 pounds and 4 feet in length. Place all items in an area no larger than 8 feet long by 4 feet high and 4 feet wide.



Bin for a Day

Have a clean-up project that is too small for a debris box? For a fee, Recology will deliver a 4-yard dumpster to your property. You load it up—they pick it up (within 7 days of delivery). This service is available to all residents and businesses.

RecycleMyJunk

Want someone else to do your clean-up? For a fee, Recology can do the heavy lifting and removal for you! Call Recology for an estimate.

Re-Use Organizations

Before you throw it out, repair it or see if someone else can use it! In addition to the annual City-wide Garage Sale (see page 3), Goodwill and Salvation Army, try these resources:

NextDoor.com: Offer your items for free or sale to nearby neighbors

ExcessAccess.org: Links donations of business and household items with the wish-lists of nearby non-profits that can provide pick-ups or accept drop-offs.

Fogster.com: Offers free classified ads in conjunction with local newspaper *Mountain View Voice*.

Freecycle.org: Everything posted must be offered free of charge. Search the site for the local groups, each is moderated by a local volunteer and is free to join.

Habitat.org/restores: Habitat for Humanity ReStores accept donations of household goods, appliances, furniture, and building supplies.

Repair Café: Visit a local Repair Café event to get help fixing electronic devices and small appliances like toasters and blenders, and mending clothes. For the next event date

and location visit **RepairCafeMV.org**. Repair Café is a volunteer-run community service.

By Appointment Drop Off

Please dispose of hazardous waste properly by making an appointment at a free drop-off event. **NEVER** place any hazardous waste in garbage or recycling. Doing so puts workers who sort materials at the SMaRT Station at risk. The program is funded by Mountain View and other cities for residents' convenience. Appointments required. WASTED FOOD REDUCTION EFFORTS GET A BOOST

Governor Brown recently signed into law two important bills that can help reduce wasted food.

- The California Good Samaritan Food Donation Act (AB 219) strengthens and expands the laws which protect food donors from liability. The new law also requires health inspectors to provide education and outreach on food donor protection laws in order to put an end to the myth that businesses can be sued for donating food.
- Food date labeling has long been confusing and misleading, causing many consumers and stores to throw away perfectly good food. AB 954 promotes the widespread use of just two standard phrases for food date labels: “BEST if Used By” to indicate when food is likely to taste best, and “USE by” to indicate when food may be unsafe to eat.

SPLIT RECYCLING — SPLIT TRUCK

Yes, we really do keep your recyclables separated during collection and processing! Why do we ask you to separate? Cleaner recyclables bring a higher market price, which helps to keep utility rates lower. When you set out your recycling cart, make sure wheels are against curb so materials enter proper compartment. Each compartment is unloaded separately at the SMarT Station.
