Items That Don't Belong in Recology Containers

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE & ELECTRONIC WASTE AND DISPOSAL

It is unsafe to dispose of hazardous waste in your Recology containers. Unwanted household chemical products and electronic waste can be disposed of for free by using the Santa Clara County Household Hazardous Waste Program.

Accepted items include:

- Batteries
- Fluorescent and LED light bulbs
- Auto fluids
- Household cleaners
- Paint
- Electronics

SAFE MEDICATION AND SHARPS DISPOSAL

Please do not place unwanted medications or sharps in your Recology containers. Store sharps in a hard sided container for safe disposal.

BULKY ITEMS

Large items that do not belong in your containers include:

- Large appliances
- Furniture
- Mattresses
- Box springs

Please contact your property owner/manager for information on how to dispose of these items.

FLUORESCENT BULB DISPOSAL

Fluorescent bulbs cannot be placed in your containers. You may drop them off at **Johnson Lumber Ace Hardware** 600 Tennant Avenue

MFD Service Guide

California's SB 1383 requires Multifamily Dwellings (MFDs) with five or more units to arrange for both recycling and organics collection services. Recology can provide tools and guidance to meet state requirements.



MULTIFAMILY SERVICE PROGRAMS

FREE BUDDY BAGS

Reuse this bag to store and transfer your recyclables to your recycle container. Contact your property manager to request yours today!



Lids are to remain closed at all times. Don't overfill.

Recycle cart may be brown or blue.

ORGANICS COLLECTION – IT'S THE LAW!

Place your food scraps, food soiled paper, and yard waste into your green organics container.



Lids are to remain closed at all times. Don't overfill.

Branches must be 6 inches or less in diameter.

To request a free kitchen collection container, contact your property manager.

Recycle

TIPS FOR RECYCLING

Place items loose in your brown or blue recycle container. Do not bag recyclables.

Recyclables should be emptied or scraped.

Cut and flatten cardboard to fit loosely in your recycle container. Foam and other plastic packaging material should be placed in the garbage.

UNACCEPTED ITEMS

- Food
- Plastic bags
- Polystyrene foam
- Toilet paper
- Clothes and bedding
- Ceramics, glassware, and mirrors
- Toys
- Electronic waste
- Automotive parts
- Hazardous waste

Organics

REMEMBER TO INCLUDE THE FOOD

Collect food in a brown paper bag, newspaper, or kitchen collection container. Paper absorbs moisture which helps control odors and pests.

Store food scraps in the freezer and place into your organics cart the night before service day.

To request a free kitchen collection container, contact your property manager.

UNCOATED FOOD-SOILED PAPER PRODUCTS

UNACCEPTED ITEMS

- Plastic bags
- Animal waste
- Bags and products labeled "compostable" or "biodegradable"
- Palm trees, yucca leaves, oleander, and poison oak
- Hazardous waste

Garbage

IF IT'S NOT RECYCLABLE OR COMPOSTABLE, IT BELONGS IN THE GARBAGE

Help reduce litter in your neighborhood.

- Use bags to dispose of garbage
- Keep lids closed on the garbage containers
- Avoid overloading containers
