




### **2024 FALL NEWSLETTER**

### MAKE IT A ZERO-WASTE LUNCH PLEASE

Packing a zero-waste lunch is easier and less expensive than you might think, especially once you get a system in place.



Here are five tips to help you get started:

- Buy reusable bags and wrappers for sandwiches and snacks. A wide variety of products are available from plastic bags you can clean in the dishwasher to beeswax-coated wrappers.
- **Pack real utensils**. These can be stainless steel, bamboo, or plastic. Some come with their own carrying case and most are dishwasher safe.
- **Solution Use cloth napkins**. Find them online or make your own using fun fabric prints. (Pro tip: If sewing isn't your thing, use pinking shears to help ensure the edges don't fray.)
- Individual servings of snacks, dips, fruit, and desserts often come in single-use plastic containers. Instead, buy these items in bulk and put them into your own reusable bags and containers. This also saves money because single servings tend to cost more than buying in bulk.
- **⑤** Put water, juice, and other drinks in a reusable bottle or Thermos<sup>™</sup>. Such a simple act could eliminate hundreds of plastic bottles per year.
