Holiday tree recycling

Recology accepts holiday trees for recycling! Flocked trees (sprayed with artificial snow) are not accepted.

- 1. Remove all decorations, tinsel, and tree stands.
- 2. Cut tree into three-foot sections.
- 3. Place small branches/pieces inside the cart.
- 4. Make sure your organics cart is at the curb alongside your tree.





ORGANICS COLLECTION — IT'S THE LAW!

Your green organics cart is for more than just yard trimmings. Don't forget to include the food!

Put these items into your green organics cart:

- Food scraps such as vegetable peelings, chicken bones, and even moldy pumpkins
- Coffee grounds and filters
- Greasy pizza boxes
- Food-soiled paper towels and napkins



Recology collects and turns your discards into nutrient-rich compost, which is used on farms.

Composting also helps reduce greenhouse gas emissions by diverting materials from landfills, which is the goal of state law SB 1383. The law mandates residents and businesses participate in curbside organics collection programs.

holiday cards, but be
wary when you are
ready to discard
them.

Hiding between the paper layers are circuit boards and batteries, making them more of an electronic device than a greeting card. Electronics are considered hazardous waste and illegal to dispose of in your garbage or recycling carts.
